# 01. Stories Shape the World

# 02. The Role of Ethical Storytelling

People should understand:

What potential risks may exist

# 04. Representation Matters

The way people are represented shapes public understanding.

Ethical storytelling:



Represents people with dignity and accuracy



Reflects complexity instead of reducing people to labels or struggles



Avoids stereotypes, tokenism, and saviour narratives



Highlights resilience, leadership, and humanity

# 05. Ethical Storytelling in the Digital Age

Digital platforms allow stories to spread globally within seconds. With opportunity comes responsibility.

Before sharing, consider:



Could this content place someone at risk?



Is sensitive information being exposed?



Have we considered the long-term impact of publication?



Virality should never come before dignity.



Every story we share represents a real person, a real community, a real life.

# 06. A Continuous Practice of Reflection

Ethical storytelling is not a checklist.

It is an ongoing commitment to learning, reflection, and accountability.

Before publishing a story, ask: yourself:

- ✓ Does this preserve dignity?
- ✓ Is this truthful and contextualized?
- ✓ Have we obtained consent?
- ✓ Who benefits from this story?
- ✓ Could this representation cause harm?

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*Responsible storytelling requires empathy, transparency, and a willingness to learn from mistakes.*
